How Can We Avoid Making These Three Common K-Readiness Mistakes?



Kristie Pretti-Frontczak, Ph.D., B2K Solutions

In our race to readiness, our hearts break as we watch so many children being left behind. We lament that PLAY is no longer how children spend their time; and the question, "Why aren't relationships our priority" keeps us up at night. You are not alone in these struggles. Many of us are seeking

a paradigm shift...a shift from compliance to compassion, from standardization to personalization, and from segregation to integration, particularly when it comes to common mistakes being made

around K-readiness policies and practices. The keynote address will explore three readiness remedies that can get providers back on track...back to doing what they do best; ensuring supportive relationships with children and families, cultivating children's love of learning, and inspiring communities of hope.



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Creating Embedded Learning Opportunities during Every Day Activities and Routines

Kristie Pretti-Frontczak, B2K Solutions

This session will explore the paradox of needing to teach with intentionality, while also following a child's lead and building upon their interests and levels of "readiness." The importance of intentionally teaching children self-regulation skills, in particular, will be discussed. Beyond providing an awareness of the social-emotional learning attributes, and the correlates of social-emotional learning and "success," we'll explore and practice, how to intentionally, mindfully, and concisely teach self-regulation across a variety of early childhood settings and routines.

Early Executive Function Skills and Future Learning Success

Tierney Popp, *Central Michigan University*This presentation will focus on how emerging executive function skills in the early years (memory, inhibitory control, and cognitive flexibility) can contribute to healthy development down the road. Individuals working with infants and toddlers will learn what executive function is, why it is important to later positive learning-related behaviors and skills, and how to promote its development in a variety of settings.

Storytime Talk: Engaging Children in Whole-Group Interactive Read-Alouds of Narrative and Informational Texts

Meghan K. Block, *Central Michigan University*Interactive reading aloud of informational and narrative texts is an important and often overlooked instructional activity that provides children a platform from which to build decontextualized language, vocabulary, print knowledge, and enthusiasm about reading. Preschool teachers will leave this session with recommendations on how to implement and enhance their whole-group interactive read-alouds.

Finding Calm in the Storm: Using a Trauma-Informed Approach to Address Difficult Behaviors



Jennifer Champagne, Ph.D., Oakland Schools
Children exhibit difficult behaviors for a variety of complex reasons. Discuss how to use a trauma-informed approach to de-escalate intense situations and to avoid intensifying challenging behaviors. Examine triggers for adult and child behavior and discuss ways of finding and/or remaining calm while supporting social emotional competence.
